A Church Family of **Be**mers

Every local church gathers as a diverse group of members who have been drastically transformed by the power of God through the Holy Spirit and the redemption power of Jesus on the cross. These assorted members with many and various skills,

spiritual gifts and talents, have no reason to live and work together in harmony, but here we are as a congregation on the corner of Walnut and 4th – being an active, kind and merciful community. We still minister to our neighbors near and far even if our pastor has retired on us. We still choose to live in love and unity, with a mission-minded spirit before you. Sunday after Sunday, you will be led in worship and service by the Lord and each other.

In my final missive, I invite you to strive to embrace one of the three types of **be**mers (members). This new word has nothing to do with "cars" but building up through your witness and stabilizing your church family while going through the "call process". Therefore, as **be**mers, you may experience some changes and transformations in the ways in which the church life is conducted. As you wait on the Holy Spirit to lead you through this "calling time", I invite you to embrace these positive values for becoming even a more faithful **be**mer (member).

1. Bemers who attend worship

Attending is the most basic way members build each other up. It's the most obvious way to show commitment to the Lord and your church home. There's something encouraging about knowing a brother or sister is simply going to be present at a church service, and you are going to worship God, together.

The writer of Hebrews tells the believers to "stir one another up to love and good deeds" and to "encourage one another". How are they to do this? By "not forsaking the assembling of the believers" (Heb. 10:23–25). You cannot build others up if you're not meeting with them regularly and faithfully in worship. But it's not the same during "the call process"! That doesn't matter. Be in your pew and support the leadership leading worship and the members who are seated about you.

2. Bemers who encourage others

Consider Paul's words about Tychicus, the lay pastor sent to lead the church at Colosse in Asia Minor, Colossians 4:1 "I have sent him to you for this very purpose, which you may know how we are and that he may encourage your hearts" (Col. 4:8). Why does he send his friend? Encouragement for the Colossians, to model the role of Paul in ministry.

The encouraging member commends, applauds, praises, thanks, comforts, supports, and volunteers for members in the church family. We often think of encouraging as merely giving praise, like a spectator at a rally or a game. That's a fan mentality. You need to be a leader and giver of grace to others for their good work and offerings.

Furthermore, encouragement is not mere flattery. It's not just being nice or telling people what they want to hear. Rather, true encouragement is honest and sincere. It commends those who serve well, and it also urges on, bolsters, those who are struggling in their walk with the Lord. Such kindness layered on others is a great blessing to the church body during a pastoral transition. Be the one who encourages.

3. Bemers who offer patience

Patience is vitally important both for the individual believer and the congregation as a whole during the call process. We do not have an excess of candidates in the seminary. After all, the Christian journey you know was never an Olympic (Continued on Page 2)

sprint but more like a marathon. Your walk with the Lord is a process of seasoned maturity.

All this means we have to learn to cope and embrace each other's weaknesses and shortcomings. We have to learn to forgive without holding grudges and disciple one another with all patience. A patient member graciously puts up with other people's botches. They realize that no church is perfect—and as a result, they are tenderly patient. A church with patient members is a church where members confront one another in love, encourage one another in hope and forgive one another abundantly. Why? Because we are in this transitional call process – together.

My friend travelers, pursue these qualities in your own life and lift up others during this transitional call process. Pray that you will build up the church membership as faithfully patient, encouraging and active members.

Finally, remember – during this "call process" – be more kind and helpful with the leadership and flexible with each other. Why? Subsequently, people come before programs. Programs enhance the person's journey through faith.

We need more **be**mers. See you around town. *Pastor John*

Tar Hollow Reflections

Each day at camp – we have time early in the day to be alone with the Lord and reflect on a written spiritual guide – a tryst time. I offer two snippets of written material from that experience. For I found their reflections pertinent to our current church family situation: entering the "Call System". Listen and tryst on the insights of these two authors, **Jenna Boewe and Camryn McGlumphy**, as they relate to your journey of faith and your mutual call journey.

The simple yet profound lyrics of the children's song, "O Be Careful", beautifully echo this truth:

O be careful little eyes what you see O be careful little ears what you hear O be careful little hands what you do O be careful little tongue what you say O be careful little feet where you go O be careful little heart who you trust O be careful little mind what you think <u>Chorus</u>: For the Father up above is looking down in love

These verses remind us to be mindful of what we allow into our lives and how we respond. Our eyes, ears, hands, tongues, feet, hearts, and minds are all influenced by our surroundings, and it is our responsibility to guard them carefully.

So how can we change our surroundings to encourage a better product?

- 1. **Evaluate Your Relationships:** Take a moment to assess the people in your life. Are they encouraging you to be your best self? Are they drawing you closer to God? If not, it might be time to reconsider the amount of influence you allow them to have.
- 2. **Choose Uplifting Content:** Be intentional about the content you consume. Seek out materials that inspire you, teach you, and bring you joy. Let go of content that brings you down or leads you away from your values.
- 3. **Create a Positive Environment:** Cultivate spaces that foster your spiritual and emotional growth. This could be a quiet corner for prayer, a tidy workspace, or simply a clutter-free home. Your environment can greatly influence your mindset and productivity.

Remember, you are the product of your surroundings. Choose wisely, and let your environment reflect the goodness and wisdom of God. - *Jenna Boewe*

What does it mean for God to be trustworthy?

The word *emet* is a common word used to describe God in the Bible and is translated as "faithfulness" or "truth". So, saying God is "full of emet", we are saying that He is trustworthy. But trust isn't always an easy thing. For example, God promised the Israelites that He would give them a king of peace that would rule forever and ever, but Israel's kingdom collapsed and they found themselves without a home or a king. They wondered if God was truly faithful to His promises and cried out to Him,

Psalm 89:49 Where is your loyal love that you swore to David in your emet?

Ultimately, God answered their cries in the person of Jesus – the embodiment of God's trustworthy character. Jesus is the faithful king whose Kingdom will endure forever, and He invites all people to trust in Him. When it's hard to trust God because our circumstances make it difficult, we can remember the history of God's trustworthy character. God has always been faithful in the past and will remain true into the future. - *Camryn McGlumphy*

A Lesson of 1/3rds

An old mentor of mine back when I was a student pastor in Bethlehem PA, shared with me this lesson about leaving the church when you move on to another call or in my case toward retirement. I found this lesson most valuable across many lines of leadership, coaching, teaching.

Pastor Francis taught me the lesson of 1/3rds.

When you leave: 1/3 of the people will miss you deeply; 1/3 of the people will be glad to see you go; and 1/3 of the people will not realize you left for three months.

I must say, Pastor Francis was "spot on". I have experienced that in my journey of faith in the five calls and eight churches I have served in the past 40 years as a pastor. It doesn't matter what 1/3 you land on in this scenario, what matters most is that you persist in kindness, prayerfulness, faithfulness and patience with your Lord, your Joint Board, your staff and your "tribe". You will walk through the valley of the "call process" together. Pastor John


